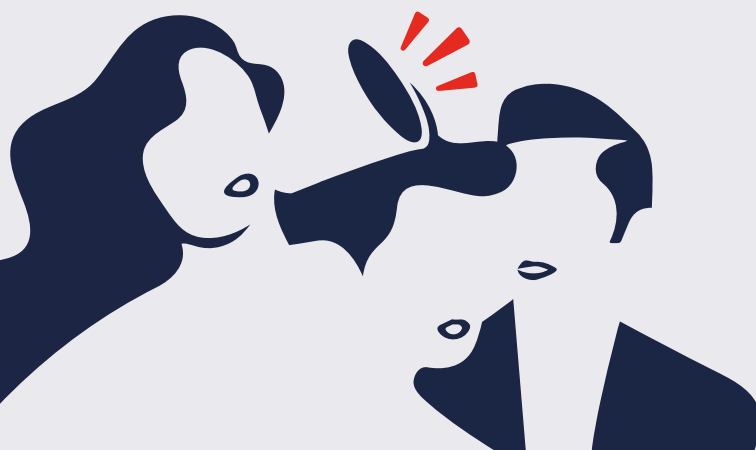

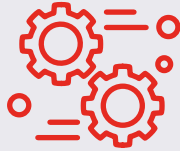

Key facts on the European Citizens' Initiative



Became operational
on 1 April 2012 when the first
ECI regulation started to apply.



Introduced by the **Lisbon Treaty** which entered into force on 1 December 2009.



Organisers use the Commission-run **Online Collection System** free of charge, enabling online collection of signatures in full compliance with data protection legislation.



1 million signatures

needed to submit your proposal to the Commission, with the obligation of reaching the minimum threshold numbers in at least 7 EU countries.



Several European citizens' initiatives have successfully reached the required number of support statements for the European Commission to take action. Some have resulted in **new legislation**, while others have had other **meaningful results**.

Participatory democracy at EU level – a short guide

As an EU citizen, you have the right to take part in the EU decision-making process. Here, we take a look at the vast landscape of tools that allow you to have your voice heard and get involved and shape policies at EU level.

1. Vote or run as a candidate in European elections. Vote for the candidates whose political agenda best reflects your wishes for the EU. Throughout their mandate, keep in touch with your MEPs so they can represent your interests. EU nationals living in another EU country also have electoral rights. You also have the right to run as a candidate in elections. [Find out how.](#)

2. European Citizens' Initiative – As outlined above, the [ECI](#) allows you to propose action on an issue you care about and gather support across the EU. Once 1 million signatures are collected, you will meet with the Commission and participate in a public hearing at the European Parliament. The Commission will then examine the substance of your initiative and adopt a formal response outlining what action it will take or, if no follow up action is proposed, explain why not. If the Commission considers making a legislative proposal, the principles of subsidiarity, proportionality and better law-making will apply. In most cases, the European Parliament and Council will need to adopt the proposal for it to become EU law.

3. The Have Your Say portal outlines the many ways EU citizens can contribute to EU policies and the ways the European Commission works. In addition to the European Citizens' Initiative, the [Public Consultations and Feedback](#) pillar enables citizens and businesses to share their views on upcoming EU policies and existing laws. You can share their your views, by replying to questionnaires, on the Commission's initiatives and contribute to the decision-making process. You can also take part in a debate or citizens' panel through the [Citizens' Engagement Platform](#). There is a dedicated online space with real-time translation to encourage engagement in European-level discussions regarding important upcoming EU proposals. The European Commission is eager to learn about citizens' opinions at an early stage when drawing up new policy initiatives. [Learn more.](#)

4. Submit a petition to the European Parliament regarding the way European legislation is implemented and affects your life. Petitions relate to existing EU activities; they cannot request proposals for new EU laws; they can be submitted by a single petitioner. The Petitions Committee of the European Parliament aims to provide a response to all petitions and, when possible, a non-judicial remedy to legitimate concerns on issues related to the EU fields of activity which petitioners raise.
